Social-emotional learning (SEL) is the process of developing the self-awareness, self-control, and interpersonal skills that are vital for school, work, and life success.

From effective problem-solving to self-discipline, from impulse control to emotion management and more, SEL provides a foundation for positive, long-term effects on kids, adults, and communities.

Curriculum and other ways SEL is brought to Mrs. Kaiser-Smith's Classroom:

There are a variety of ways to help students in the SEL realm at SPPCS. In the SEL

Classroom there can be one on one counselor time, group sessions if needed, sensory time, play to learn time with the class, Brain Breaks, Second Step Lessons, Virtue Lessons, Lessons of Illinois State Standards in SEL, Book Read Alouds, and many more. We wantyour child to be as successful as possible at school. Success in school is not just about core subjects. It is also about knowing yourself and how to get along with others. Grades Pre-K through 5th grade can use the Second Step program to help teach these critical skills in the SEL Classroom. The Second Step program teaches skills in the following four areas: 1. Skills for Learning: Students gain skills to help themselves learn, including how to focus their attention, listen carefully, and be assertive when asking for help with schoolwork. 2. Empathy: Students learn to identify and understand their own and others' feelings. Students also learn how to take another's perspective and how to show compassion. 3. Emotion Management: Students learn specific skills for calming down when experiencing strong feelings, such as anxiety or anger. 4. Problem Solving: Students learn a process for solving problems with others in a positive way. Your child will be learning a lot this year—and he or she will need your help. Second Step has an area on their website for families to look at different ways they can discuss SEL at home. These include Family Codes to use on the website. 
